

## LIBRARY NEWS

### READING

Reading for pleasure continues to be the number one indicator of academic success. The Growing Independence: Summary of Key Findings from the Competent Learners at 14 Project report found that students who love reading had:

- higher scores on the cognitive and social/attitudinal competencies
- consistently higher scores in mathematics, reading, logical problem-solving and attitude
- higher average scores for engagement in school, positive communication and relations with family, and positive friendships
- showed less risky behaviour
- higher levels of motivation towards school.

Those who did not enjoy reading were more likely to be:

- heavier television watchers over time
- exposed to bullying experiences
- seen by teachers as having difficult classroom behaviour at age 12
- less likely to complete their homework
- less likely to be enthusiastic about going to school.

### The Auckland Writer's Festival is on next week.

On Thursday a group of students and teachers are attending the Secondary schools programme at the Aotea Centre. This is always an inspiring and informative experience and an opportunity for young people to meet published authors and spoken word artists.

## The Careers Coach Roadshow

After a successful visit last year the Careers Coach Roadshow returned this week, once again supported by Tracey from Youth Connections and sponsored by the Papakura Local Board. The aim of the visit is to showcase their state of the art, custom made careers coach to the Year 10 core classes allowing the students to use one of the 26 touchscreen Careers Kiosks with individual headsets and navigate their way through various career paths reflected via the 6 Vocational Pathways. Each Pathway leads to individual video clips with information about the selected industry/organisation. Joining them this year has been a representative from the Armed Services.



## 13 Reasons Why (from Ministry of Education Bulletin)

You may recall the public discussion generated by last year's Netflix series 13 Reasons Why.

Season two will be released worldwide on Friday 18 May. This show was widely watched by teenagers last year. Themes of suicide, sexual assault, consent, bullying and other issues made some viewers feel distressed and in need of support. Similar and equally confronting themes will be present in season two. In the lead-up to the release, some young people may re-watch the first season, or watch it for the first time.

Young people feel the show represents the issues they face. Banning or recommending a ban on viewing it can be harmful, as young people will still watch it but feel they have to hide that from adults.

The issues raised in the series are significant and offer a good opportunity to talk to our young people about these difficult life events – but it is important that those conversations are safe ones. We are working with other agencies to ensure information is available to support and encourage safe conversations between young people and their parents, or another trusted adult, if they view this series.

Some of this information is already available on the resource hub on the [Mental Health Foundation](#) website. Additional support material will be added to this hub prior to 18 May.

13 Reasons Why is not the only challenging series young people are watching but it is one of the most talked about. The Office of Film and Literature Classification has released a guide for parents: Talking with young people about what they're watching. We encourage you to share this guide, and the Mental Health Foundation's hub of resources with your parent and whānau community.

If you, or parents or whānau, are concerned about a young person, please reach out for help. The Mental Health Foundation have a list of contacts, or phone your local DHBs Mental Health Crisis Team. Support is also available from a trained counsellor anytime by calling or texting 1737.




