Year 13 Economics Field Trip to the Waihi Gold Mine

On Wednesday 15th June the students from 13 Economics travelled to Waihi to learn about the positive and negative effects for third parties caused by the mining operations of Oceana Gold. This is the only place in New Zealand where mining takes place in the middle of a town and under housing. By touring the Martha mine site, the processing plant area and the tailings impoundment site we were able to see first hand some of the effects of the mining. We learnt about the different interventions that the government and local council have taken to minimise and reduce the negative effects of the mining operations such as the dust and vibrations, while also learning about some of the positive effects as well such as the creation of an inland dotterel nesting area and the local employment.

It was a great chance to see the theory we have learnt in class being applied to a business, and we got to touch a piece of 24 carat gold! A big thank you goes out to Phil Salmon and the education centre at the mine for a great tour that was well tailored to our internal assessment. On our way back we stopped and explored some of the old mining sites in the Karangahake Gorge and saw how the council has turned this area into an attraction for local people as well as tourists.



NEW ZEALAND SPELLING BEE SEMI-FINALS

Miss Lock is excited to announce three junior students from Rosehill College have qualified for the New Zealand Spelling Bee Semi-Finals. This means they ranked in the top 200 of the New Zealand Spelling Bee competition.

This involved weekly meetings, working from a list of 100 words to learn. Word lists were created of unknown, random words to learn, as the test would involve only 50 from the 100 word list, and another 50 words not seen previously. This meant, at times, these committed students sometimes learned a massive set of 40 words per week; or 20 words per week from my unknown word list.

Level 2 Chemistry Yashili Trip

On Wednesday 5 July students from all three Level 2 Chemistry classes boarded buses to visit the Yashili Milk Powder factory in Pokeno. We started off with a presentation by Kay Airey (a parent of past Rosehill students). She focused on the school subjects that lead on to work in the food industry. Then we did a tour of the viewing gallery where we could look down onto the drying, canning and warehouse areas. Following this, four 'rockstar' under 25 year old employees explained their backgrounds, training and roles in the factory. There was time for questions and answers and tasting of the product. Finally, tips and advice on how to go about making yourself employable and attending an interview. The main message was 'stay at school and get at least NCEA Level 2'.

Quotes from students:

I enjoyed finding out how our chemistry i.e titrations could apply in real life with real paying jobs. I found it interesting that milk powder requires that amount of testing. I found this trip overall very useful, and I think that working in the food industry is a new possibility.

I actually never knew that robots helped in the food industry whether it was packing and all, so it was quite cool to see one in action.

Finding out what type of jobs are available and seeing how the work we do in chemistry relates to a real world situation (was good).

I found the trip to the Yashili milk factory quite interesting, and it was nice to learn about how the milk we drink and the baby formula is made, including the different sciences behind it. I liked hearing the stories from the workers of not only what their jobs entailed, but also about what led them to this career path, looking at their plans for their future, their subjects they took at school, and hearing their advice for us about our future career options too. I'm quite interested in how different things are made and the sciences behind them so this experience was interesting for me.

I found the processes they do behind the scenes interesting such as titrations to find the pH levels, the pasteurization and checking the density. I also found the speeches of the staff that work there interesting, that helped me understand that plan A isn't always gonna work so I have to have plan B, C, D and so on.

The part of the trip that I found was most interesting was the production process of the milk powder. Specifically, the machinery and how they operate.





Each week, every Year 9 and 10 student is gauged against our school values by the teachers of English, Maths, Science, Social Studies and PE. Students who achieve the maximum possible marks for five weeks gain a Bronze Award. By gaining another five weeks of maximum values, students move from Bronze to Silver and so on.

The Manaakitanga awards indicate that these students are being consistently Respectful, Responsible and Caring - or in other words are showing Manaakitanga.

Brain Bee Competition Second Round

The Brain Bee Competition is organised annually by the University of Auckland to create community awareness on one of the least understood, most fascinating parts of the human body - the BRAIN.

On 5th July Joshua Gilmore & Kiana Lawton participated in the second round of the Brain Bee Competition at the Faculty of Medicine at UoA.

This has been a brilliant experience for both of them. They not only participated in individual round but also joined a composite team.

Unfortunately they could not make it into the final round but visited the Medicine building, heard from an experienced neurologist and listened

to their latest research, getting to see human organs in an anatomy lab and also looked at brain cells under electron microscopes. Getting to watch the final round has been an excellent experience for students as well as accompanying staff; it will help the Science faculty to encourage and support next year's participants in a more systematic way.



THE RISING FOUNDATION

What is the Rising Foundation?

The Rising Foundation (TRF) is essentially a Youth Leadership and Character Development programme currently running in five South Auckland High Schools. TRF has been operating 'under the radar' at Rosehill College for the last two years. The Programme aims to unlock the potential of talented and capable students from many different backgrounds. TRF promotes a range of values, principles and life skills that help the members to develop their leadership skills, confidence, independence and responsibility. The aim is to create a family environment where the members feel safe and supported yet challenged to achieve to the best of their ability. Throughout the term we meet 2-3 times a week where we deliver the teaching portion of the programme and have some fun along the way. Each term break we run a camp or excursion on which the students must work as a team to fundraise for. This is a big part of TRFs philosophy of "a hand up, not a handout" which reinforces the message of working hard for what we want in life.

TRF offers a huge range of opportunities and also helps the students referred to us choose their pathway into Tertiary Education, Trades Programmes or Employment. Ours is a long term programme that is open for students from all year levels, ethnicities, cultures and abilities at high school. We aim to support the 'middle band', rather than students who are already supported by government agencies or those who have ample support from home. Some are even referred to us during their last year of intermediate school. We prefer for students to spend the whole five years with us, but students volunteer to join us and it is up to the individual to decide how long they stay.

Overall the Rising Foundation provides a place of training and support for young people where they can learn to unlock the huge potential inside themselves.




