The Smashed Project is an educational theatre initiative with a vision to break the culture of underage drinking and reduce alcohol related harm amongst young people around the world. All Year 9 students will follow the lives of three young people and witness how they become involved with alcohol and how it affects their lives. After the performance there is an interactive workshop which will enable the students to explore the facts about underage drinking and develop strategies for resisting peers' influence. ### PROCEDURES FOR VISITORS TO THE SCHOOL

2. When you come into school make sure you sign in at Reception, just inside the main front door.
3. Please ask for a visitor's sticker, if it is not given automatically, which you must wear at all times whilst you are on school grounds.
4. Remember to sign out when you leave.

## Measles in Auckland schools

Please vaccinate your child or young person if they have not had one measles (MMR) vaccine. It is free at your GP.

Students in a class with someone who has measles may be asked to stay home for one to two weeks, if they have had no MMR vaccinations.

Students with one or more MMR vaccinations can still attend school.

Check your child's immunisation records in their Well Child/Tamariki Ora book or ring your GP clinic.

Tell your GP or after hours clinic if you suspect measles before you arrive, so you don't infect others.

Symptoms: cough, runny nose, fever, sore red eyes, then a rash.



### 1. What is measles?

Measles is a virus that can make adults and children very sick. It is highly infectious and can spread quickly and easily through breathing, sneezing and coughing. If you are not immune to measles, you can catch the disease just by being in the same room as someone who has it.

### 2. What are the symptoms of measles?

Measles symptoms include a high fever, runny nose, cough and sore red eyes, followed several days later by a rash starting on the face and neck before spreading to the rest of the body. Someone with measles can spread it to others from five days before the rash appears until five days after.

### 3. What will we do if we have a suspected case of measles at school?

If we suspect measles because a student or staff member has a fever, rash or a number of the symptoms above, they will be isolated away from others and sent home. The student or staff member will need to see a doctor and be cleared of measles before they can return to school. It's important that they, or their caregiver, ring ahead to let the health center, hospital or A&E clinic know so they can be isolated on arrival.

### 4. Who is immune?

People are immune and not at risk of measles if they...

Have had one (ideally two) doses of Measles, Mumps, Rubella (MMR) vaccine documented in a Well Child/Tamariki Ora book or by a doctor. Were born before 1969, as they would very likely have had measles as a student

Have been diagnosed with measles before.

Have had a blood test confirming immunity

People are not immune or are at risk of measles if they...

Have had no doses of MMR vaccine

Have a weakened immune system

Have had a blood test that confirms they are not immune

Are currently pregnant and not known to be immune

### 5. Infection control

If you have a confirmed case of measles at your school, no special cleaning is required. This is because the measles virus has a short survival time (less than 2 hours) and is rapidly inactivated by heat and sunlight.

## NAMING GEAR

Your son or daughter is being invited to take part in Youth'19 –Survey of the Health and Wellbeing of NZ Secondary School Students.

A sample of students from Years 9-13 will be selected at random to take part in this survey, and your son or daughter might be one of those selected.

This information pamphlet is to inform you as a parent and or whānau about the Youth'19 Survey and you are encouraged to discuss the survey with your son or daughter.

If you do not want your son or daughter to participate in the Youth'19 Survey please contact the school office within two weeks of receiving this brochure and the school liaison person for the survey will remove their name from the list of students who have been selected to take part in the survey.

### What is the Youth'19 Survey for?

The aim of the survey is to get reliable and up-to-date information on the health and wellbeing of young people in New Zealand. Basically, we want to find out what young people in New Zealand are really like and how well they are doing.

This information will help to improve health services and programmes for young people.

More than 50 secondary schools throughout the Auckland, Northland and Waikato regions have agreed to take part in the survey, which will involve approximately 8,300 students altogether.
